UPPP 246 Housing Policy

Is housing a human right? Should every person have the opportunity to live in safe, clean, and stable housing? This course explores housing policy in the United States and analyzes case studies of international comparative research. A house is often the center of one's life, and people have emotional, social, and financial attachments to their home and community. Housing is one of the highest expenses for an individual or family. The dream of owning a home is an unaffordable reality for most people in the U.S. This course discusses why housing is so expensive and the mechanics of the real estate market. In addition, students will learn how the private, public, and nonprofit sectors fund, build, regulate, and manage housing. The course provides an overview of policies to provide affordable housing and supportive services for low income persons and persons experiencing homelessness. In addition, students will study new affordable housing programs and initiatives for sustainable green building, linkages with public transportation, and innovative design.

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
